He recruited a party of eight to hack the 35 miles through sawgrass swamp and stake out a route for the two dredges to follow. (The recruitment encount ered difficulties from two groups, he said, those who never had been in the Glades and were afraid to go and those who had been and didn't want to back.)

10 DAYS REQUIRED

It took the party 10 days to make the 35 miles. They still missed a meeting with the inland dredge by four miles although they followed the line on a map provided in Tallahassee.

Past and present members of the Cabinet board of 11 fund trustees, old friends and associates of Elliot during his half-century of service to the state were prefor dedication of the Elliot build-

Governor Bryant presided for the series of short talks and the unveiling of a portrait of Elliot which was given by Mrs. Elliot. The Elliots also presented to the Board for use in the building a silver service which he said was given to him once by an engineering firm he had served as a consultant.

Elliot, of Tallahassee lineage, was graduated from Virginia Military Institute in 1901 and practiced civil engineering in New York City and Mexico until 1908 before he returned to Florida to work with the Everglades drainage project as an assistant engineer.

CHIEF ENGINEER

He became chief drainage engineer in 1913 and served in that position until 1931. From 1929 until his retirement in 1958 he was chief engineer and secretary for the II Fund trustees, and for part of that time served also as director of the budget for the Cabinet.

In addition to the Everglades drainage work, he designed the intracoastal waterway from the St. Johns river to Miami, drew the first plans for the Everglades National Park, and generally supervised drainage and waterways developments throughout Florida.

State Treasurer Ed Larson, Attorney General Richard Ervin, Comptroller Ray Green and Com-missioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner, all members of the II Board with the Governor, spoke briefly.

Others present included retired State Treasurer W. V. Knott, who was a member of the II Board when Elliot began serving it; Supreme Court Justice Glenn Terrell, who was attorney for the board during the early years of Elliot's service; and retired Secretary of State R. A. Gray, who was on the Budget Commission
